#### The Most Proficient Pilot

The Most Proficient Pilot on each course is awarded a mounted set of silver wings as a record of his achievement, and is also awarded the S. J. Goble Memorial Trophy. The S. J. Goble Trophy, upon which is inscribed the name of the Most Proficient Pilot on each course, was donated by Mrs S. J. Goble to be awarded in perpetuity in memory of her late husband—Air Vice-Marshal S. J. Goble, CBE, DSO, DSC, who was one of the first members of the RAAF.

The Graduate who has shown the Most Improvement
